PRAYER

We continue to pray for all those we know who are unwell, recovering from treatment or awaiting diagnosis or results, in particular remembering Grace, Ben, Zoltan's father and Steve's sister. There are others, both in our church family and community, who also have problems which we may know nothing about, and we remember them in prayer knowing that God *does* know their needs, and asking that they will know His presence. There are so many places in the wider world where people are suffering and it is difficult to know exactly how to pray: however, God promises that He will find the words for us:

" ... the Spirit also comes to help us, weak as we are.

For we do not know how we ought to pray;

the Spirit himself pleads with God for us
in groans that words cannot express."

Romans 8:26 (Good News Translation)

The rippling waves of authentic love (Romans 12: 9-21)

Live in harmony with each other. Do not become snobbish but take a real interest in ordinary people. Do not become set in your own opinions... As far as your responsibility goes, live at peace with everyone. (vs. 16, 18; J.B. Phillips NT)

At one point or another apostle Paul often pays a poetic tribute to love, the most famous being 1 Corinthians 13. But in Romans 12 Paul does the same. He starts with "Let love be genuine" (v. 9) and then he spends the rest of the chapter describing sincere, non-hypocritical love in various spheres of the Christian life.

Depending on the translation there are over 30 imperatives in this reading, and they are all in plural. It is as if Paul saying "WARNING: Do not try this alone!" His advice is addressed to a group of people who believe in the loving sacrifice and resurrection of Christ, and they are gathered and empowered by the Spirit.

While there is no need to enforce tidiness onto Paul's advices, of which he clearly was not constrained, it is possible to see how his instructions in this passage is related to four types of interactions, which can be structured in concentric circles: (1) the immediate community, (2) other Christians beyond one's closest community, (3) enemies, and (4) everyone.

What Paul is hinting is that to love genuinely is to love as Jesus loved, but he does not just say "Grow in love!", it actually describes specific behaviours for loving others. Good distance runners while running do not just play general messages in their minds like "Relax!" or "Stay loose!" Instead, they play specific messages over and over again in their minds, like "Let your lower lip sag!" or "Feel how lose your fingers are!" These specific messages help their whole body to relax and stay loose. In the same way Paul's ideas for genuine Christ-like love in Romans 12:9-21 gives us specific ideas for the rippling waves of authentic love.

The apostle clearly articulates that authentic love requires us to engage with others in practical and physical ways. This kind of engagement is increasingly a challenge in our digital age, where technology and social media make us feel that we can maintain virtual relationships inside and outside the Christian community. The social distancing of the Covid-19 crisis increased the physical isolation of many people in our society and showed us that although we may be able to maintain some connections with others, but we cannot express genuine love effectively. Genuine love requires us to live alongside and engage with others in a full-bodied way. So, the challenge is to find ways to do this, like community larder or picnics.

Prayer: Our Lord, help us not to pretend to love others, but really love them. Help us to hate what is wrong and pursue what is good as if our life depended on it. Help us to live in true devotion to one another, loving each other as sisters and brothers. Help us to not lose your zeal for you, but serve you passionately and with enthusiasm, and help us not to forget to rejoice, for hope is always just around the corner!
