"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you." Isaiah 43:2

Through life's currents and tides feel God's guiding hand and hold on.

Therefore, let us not judge one another from now on, but rather decide this—not to put a stumbling block or a trap in the way of a brother. (v. 13, Tree of Life Version)

I love old proverbs because they represent centuries human of experience is a condensed form. I recently came across this one about relationships: "faults are thick where love is thin". This saying highlight that without affection and empathy living together (in family or community) can became a chore. However, Paul here demonstrates that among Christians (through Christ) the opposite can be achieved. Within God's family "faults are thin because love is thick."

Our reading focuses on the relationship among people who find themselves on opposing sides of certain issues: whether or not it is appropriate to eat certain foods (diet) and whether certain days deserve greater attention than others (festivals). This is not the first time the apostle discusses these issues. About 10 years earlier when he wrote to Galatians, he voiced strong opposition because they were observing "special days, and months, and seasons, and years" (Gal 4:10). The advice Paul offers here is calmer and more considered in tone. If we did not know the Galatians passages, it would be easy to read Romans 14 and think, "Food and festivals: so what?"

Looking at these two approaches we may wonder what has changed in the 10 years between the two letters. I believe that the major difference is that in Galatia, the teachers who followed Paul did seem to attribute saving powers to certain Jewish practices related to food, festivals and other things, such as circumcision, by contrast in Rome nobody was requiring these things. So, the real question Paul is trying to answer is not to eat or not to eat. But instead "What do we do when no one is claiming another Saviour besides Jesus, yet the church disagrees?"

The issues mentioned here may seem small to us after all most of us would hardly notice nowadays if some of our fellow Christians are vegetarian or vegan. But Pauls approach can be applied to any topic of disagreement we struggle with about gender, sexuality, Brexit, and immigration, or the colour of the carpet, the preferred style of worship, and the ideal selection of hymns.

So, what should we do when we disagree on the trivia? Paul's answer is to welcome one another (14:1) and to put up with each other's failings (15:1). Actually, he tells the strong to behave this way toward the weak, but his words resonate with both sides, for who on either side of any debate does not imagine themselves to be the strong and their opponents to be the people who just don't "get it" yet?

Prayer: When we turn our hearts into deserts of stony bitterness, you transform them into oases of joy. When we come up with all sorts of rules for those who come to us seeking to find you, you tear up the list, stretching wide your arms in welcoming grace. Servant of all, we offer our lives to you.
