The Currency of the Kingdom (Matthew 22:15-22)

Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God! (v. 21, J.B. Phillips)

Pharisees and the Herodians joining forces on the issue of taxation is like Conservatives and Labour agreeing 100% on the welfare budget. The Pharisees opposed the Roman empire, while the Herodians actively worked with it but their shared contempt for Jesus brought these opposing groups together.

They use one of Jesus' public Q&A sessions to trap Jesus in his own words (nowadays Andrew Marr does this brilliantly). The question "Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar?" is meant to offer no alternative but to either resist Rome or offend those who are resisting Rome. Taxes in Roman times were both a source of revenue for the empire but also Rome's mechanism for subjugating people. Not paying taxes meant defying the Empire and both the Herodians and Pharisees knew the consequences of challenging the Roman empire. They were both in power because they have been making deals with Rome for decades. Hence, it was hypocrisy on the part of the two groups to suggest that Jesus openly commit to either collaborating with or disregarding the empire. The choice for people living under oppressive regimes was, is and will be more complicated, and Jesus was not about to jeopardize the lives of those at the margins by encouraging them to defy the empire.

At this point Jesus asks for a Roman coin used to pay taxes, a coin with the Emperor's image on it. The fact that they produced the coin so quickly exposed the extent to which everyone, including the Pharisees and the Herodians, have been participating in Caesar's economy, so they were legally obligated to pay the tax. However, the question about paying taxes was not just a political question, it also had a moral connotation. After all, what is legal is not necessarily moral. What is lawful from Rome's perspective might not be acceptable to God. Hence, even as one pays taxes due to Caesar, one should also pay what is due to God. The difference is that while people pay taxes to Rome out of obligation, they "pay" to God because of their commitment to promote an alternative kingdom.

Tax can be paid without the payment being a vote of support. In Jesus' case paying taxes acknowledges Rome's political power but not its moral authority. That moral authority belongs to God. This is why Jesus adds the sentence: "give God what belongs to God." And since God does not trade in Caesar's currency the "coinage" of God's kingdom is of a radically different nature than that of Caesar. Paying to God and participating in the divine kingdom involves changing ones' value system from physical richness to spiritual prosperity. Jesus' response is a paradox, because it encourages both the paying of taxes required by the empire and resisting Rome, by actively promoting the *alternative kingdom*.

For communities that are dealing with oppressive and violent regimes, the choices are never as clear cut as paying taxes or flatly refusing to pay. Challenging the empire and undermining its oppressive powers requires lot of thoughtfulness and imagination. To answer questions like "How to remain hopeful and committed to God's kingdom in the face of persistent evil?" We may have to adopt the currency introduced by Jesus in the Beatitudes, where he suggests that whatever brings wholeness, transformation and healing to communities is a form of opposition to the power-grabbing attitudes characteristic of politicians throughout history.

Prayer: Caesar, did you create the stars, hurl them to the reaches of the universe? Did you issue rules that keep the planets in place? Can you make blood course through our veins or craft an otter or a moonflower? Well then, keep your coins, they can't buy what we need. God, it is your face we see in our world, our very selves, our breath and love. We owe every single thing to you. Claim it all. Claim us. Please take us as your own. Amen.
