Being satisfied by God

(Deuteronomy 11:10-15)

In Egypt when you planted grain, you had to work hard to irrigate the fields with your foot; but the land that you are about to enter is a land of mountains and valleys, a land watered by rain. The Lord your God takes care of and watches over it throughout the year. (Vs. 10-12, GNT)

Among the biblical books Deuteronomy is portrayed as the farewell message of Moses before he passes away. After leading Israel out of Egypt and guiding them for 40 years in the wilderness he passes on his staff to Joshua.

Some commentators interpret this book as a series of lectures on the application of the Law. It describes Kosher behaviour which includes food, sacrifice, and clothing, but it also addresses the issue of why the law should be obeyed?

In our passage the "lecturer" explains that faithful obedience to the law is the natural outcome of acknowledging God's provision. Unlike in Egypt where human effort and inventiveness could produce crops even without rain due to the constant flow River Nile, in the Promised Land they are dependent on seasonal rain.

In Egypt, they dug trenches, canals, and transport water from the Nile to irrigate the land. The expression, "with your foot" probably refers to some kind of pumping wheels, propelled by foot. In a way, the land can be watered by human effort and there is no need to depend on rain from the sky only on hard work, toil and sweat.

BUT not so in the land of Canaan. Filled with mountains and valleys, with the River Jordan miles away, people had to dig wells to get water. The Promised land is a place where the provision of water depends on "God sending rain".

The result of this is that "there will be grain, wine, and olive oil for you, and grass for your livestock. You will have all the food you want." (vs. 14,15)

Trust God to provide and you will be satisfied! In Egypt, you depended on human efforts, however when you step into this Promised Land, you have to depend on God. This new land will be different than what you were used to in Egypt where you could rely on your own effort, but if God has provided you for the last 40 years in the wilderness, you should trust Him to provide you in the new land that has limited resources.

When God puts us in a situation that seems to be beyond our ability to survive, it is never a comfortable place to be in. BUT it is in such a circumstance that we learn to depend on God fully. It is through such times we grow spiritually and our trust in God deepens.

As a church we are in a similar situation as Israel was before they entered the Promised land. As we seek the future of the church, we know we have to cross the Jordan, but it is frightening. Egypt is out of the question, the wilderness is only a temporary solution, but we only have limited resources. What we are left with in this situation is God's presence and provision which I believe should be enough.

Prayer: Why should I feel discouraged? Why should the shadows come? Why should my heart be lonely, and long for heaven and home? When Jesus is my portion? My constant friend is He: His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me. I sing because I'm happy, I sing because I'm free. For His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me. (Civilla D. A Titanic Sacrifice

A letter written on Titanic stationary, dated April 11th, 1912, by **Pastor John Harper** is to be auctioned on November 14th at the Henry Aldridge Auction House in Devizes, Wiltshire.

At the time of the Titanic disaster, Harper, who was 39, was a widower with a six-year-old daughter, Annie Jessie, and was pastor of **Walworth Road Baptist Church** in London. He was travelling with his daughter and sister Jessie Leitch to Chicago to preach for several weeks at the Moody Church, where he had been guest minister the previous Autumn.

His daughter and sister were put on a lifeboat and survived, but Harper stayed on board and gave his life jacket to a fellow passenger. Contemporary accounts state that Harper preached the Gospel to the end (especially Acts 16:31), first aboard the sinking ship, and then afterwards to those in the freezing water, before succumbing to the inevitable.

The letter is estimated at £30,000 to £50,000, but the sacrifice John Harper made was beyond price.

What an inspiration! I hope it gives us all to think of what we would be prepared to sacrifice.
