<u>Transfiguration: a transformative experience</u> (Mark 9:2-9)

He was transfigured before them and his clothes become radiant, intensely white as no launderer on earth could bleach them. (vs 2&3, Mounce)

Probably the greatest challenge about reading the story of transfiguration is the pressure to fully understand and explain what has happened. Somehow, we expect that the story must have a deeper symbolic meaning. However, if we resist the temptation to explain every single detail in this story, we might be able to experience as the disciples did.

Think about it. When has the idea of a brilliantly glowing holy figure ever "made sense," anyway? The transfigured Jesus isn't supposed to be figured out. He is supposed to be appreciated and we should be drawn to him.

At first, it seems, Jesus and Peter, James, and John are out for a hike. They climb а mountain to eniov surrounding vista. But then everything changes. Suddenly as if a veil has been removed from before their eyes Jesus humanness is lifted to reveal his divinity: wondrous. frightening, powerful, unexpected, and rich, connecting all ages (the prophets Elijah and Moses with Jesus), giving enlightenment. His external appearance is utterly changed.

This is not to be approached with the assumption that we can understand it. The aim is to draw us toward what is abnormal, unnatural—like the burning fire that does not consume the bush (Moses' first encounter with God in Exodus 3:1-6) and like the fire Elijah received from God on the altar drenched in water (1 Kings 18). The transfiguration elevates Jesus into the realm of the two prophets who stand beside him on the mountain.

The disciples are terrified, and they fear they will be harmed, yet at the same time they try to remain in the presence of what terrifies them. At which point a loud voice, just like at the Baptism of Jesus, declares Jesus his Son. Here, the voice is directed at the disciples, to the church, rather than to the Son as it was at his baptism. It speaks to Jesus' identity so that the church can see who Jesus really is.

We sometimes use the words "transfigure" "transform" and interchangeably, but is there distinction which is important to keep in mind. To be transfigured is to be changed in appearance or form. However, transformation means a complete or essential change in character or structure. Jesus' transfiguration does not alter his character but allowed the observers to see him in a new form, they gained a new understanding of him because they saw him in a different light. Jesus on the mountain with Moses and Elijah is not transformed (changed inwardly) but transfigured before his disciples (shown to be other than assumed).

The power of the Transfiguration is that it plants in our hearts and minds the brilliance of eternity, reassuring us to journey together as the body of Christ. The Transfiguration thus prepares us to come to terms with our humility, our soil nature, our utter dependence on God.

The church has a responsibility: to listen to God's Son. That listening does not result in staying aloof where the air is pure, and the view is stunning. The church must listen to the voice of God's Word in the midst of fellow humans, within the social context they live in and

in a way which is relevant in their culture they live in.

Prayer: Our Lord, dazzle us with your holy love, draw us into your purifying presence, and speak to us your transforming truth. Then, grant us grace to live every moment changed by such glory — daring to live with hope and courage and love reflecting the life of Jesus, through whom your glory shines in the most unexpected ways. Amen.

Beauty in the desert

I have been privileged to travel widely in my life. I have seen majestic mountains, green valleys covered in wildflowers, awe-inspiring waterfalls, animals of every size and shape, and oceans teeming with fantastically coloured coral and fish.

But one of my favourite areas of beauty is the desert. I have wept for joy at a breath-taking sunset. I have been lost for words at the intricacy of limestone formations. I have laughed with exhilaration, racing over massive sand dunes on a quad bike.

We often use the desert as a metaphor for difficult times, loneliness or solitude. Indeed, all of these have their place,

and God can teach us much, and show us his power and faithfulness in them. Lent can be like that. It reminds us of the sadness of Jesus' journey to the Cross; of the seriousness of our failures which demanded his sacrifice; of the wretchedness of life without the grace of God.

But the desert can also be a place of life and growth, of amazing discovery, of adventure and celebration.

And Lent can be the same—as we read our Bibles, give more time to prayer, live generously and spend time with the people of God (albeit by phone or at a distance!)-- we can be enriched in faith, encouraged in hope and excited by all that God can do in and through our lives each day as we give ourselves into his hands.

In Philippians 4, Paul exhorts us to rejoice in the Lord. I love the way Eugene Peterson phrases it in The Message: Celebrate God all day, every day. I mean, *revel* in him!

Let's make Lent not only a time of reflection, but also a time of rejoicing—beauty in the desert.
