#### Trinity Sunday: Grace, love, and fellowship!

(2 Cor 13:11,14)

I close my letter with these last words: Be happy, perfect yourself, listen to what I have said. Live in harmony and peace. And may the God of love and peace be with you. So may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, God's love and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

These very familiar words which we often use as the final blessing at our church services signal not only the end of the second letter to the Corinthians, but also the conclusion of his ministry to a church wrought in conflict – a church which gave Paul immense joy, yet at the same time broke his heart. It seems that Paul's last words to this church echoes his mixed sentiments.

Apostle Paul's final instructions come in quick succession and try to reiterate his message throughout the letter: in order to be glad, they must live in harmony and peace, which may not happen in an instance, but can be nurtured and perfected with the help of the *God of Love* (only used here in the entire Old and New Testament).

As usual Paul closed the letter with a blessing which we call *The Grace*. However, unlike most Pauline blessings which contains two elements (dyad) this blessing has a triad, incorporating both God the Father, Christ the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Each person of the trinity delivering one aspect of what the Corinthians require to become a thriving community.

The unconditional, all-encompassing, and compassionate *grace* is a gift of Jesus Christ that clears not only the conscience of the individual Christian but can also clear the air in a divided church. The love is yet again reaffirmed to be an endowment of the Father, who is the creator of Love, after all he is the God of Love. A church which tries to re-establish unity needs a vast amount of affection to get through the past hurt. Finally, the Holy Spirit infuses us with a sense of belonging in the family of God and a sense of community with fellow Christians. This sense of belonging depends not on personal interests, nor on social hierarchies, but on the core experience of being adopted into God's family through the Holy Spirit. Paul prays that the members of the Corinthian church may experience a deep bond with each other, because he cannot see a sustainable future for a believer who is believing without belonging.

I wish, hope, and pray that through the COVID-19 crisis, self-isolation, shielding and social distancing we may experience Christ's *liberating grace*, God's *healing love* and the Holy Spirit's *bonding fellowship*. **Amen.** 

#### Prayer: Blow, wind of God,

Blow away the tight rules that hold me back from trusting, risking, loving. Blow away my failings that stands in the way of link up with my neighbours. Equip me with courage and vision for the new thing that waits around the corner. We cannot choose the stories we have inherited, But we can choose the stories that we become.


