

Refugees and strangers

(1 Peter 2:11-25)

Dearly beloved, I ask you, as refugees and strangers, to refrain from instant gratification, which tries to subdue the soul. You should have such good behaviour among the non-believers, that even those who accuse you of wrongdoing may observe your good deeds and glorify God on the day of his inspection. (11, 12 ZBV)

Emigrating to a different country is a challenging experience. It is not only the new way of communication which makes settling in difficult, but also the social and cultural behaviour need to be recognized and adopted. You do not have to permanently emigrate to another country to have this *out-of-place* feeling, tourist often experienced this sense of being lost not necessarily physically, but culturally; and this is true even in other English-speaking countries.

The first communities who adopted the Christian faith often continued to live in the same place, but due to their moral code gave up certain cultural customs, such as presenting sacrifices to idols, praying to the Cesar and consuming blood. Therefore, they were often perceived by their host culture as strangers or even as dissenters who wanted to disturb the existing social order. This is why the early church was ostracised and persecuted.

When apostle Peter addresses these communities, he acknowledges that they are strangers, more than that, they are refugees, who had been uprooted and who will never be quite settled. They had to adopt and integrate into the host cultures but will never be fully part of it. The apostle highlights that in these situations there are two dangers, both of which stem from selfishness. *Full integration* results in losing a core part of who they are (giving up on themselves), while the outcome of *full separation* is dissent (giving up on others). So, to find balance Christians should stand out not only with their refusal to get fully immersed in the culture of instant gratification, but also by getting fully absorbed by the selfless example of Christ and fully motivated of helping others (embracing both themselves and others).

Living during the present crisis we often feel like strangers and refugees: out-of-place, disconnected and isolated. On the one hand, if we give in to the pull of instant gratification and give up on ourselves, we can end up hitting the bottle before breakfast, on the other hand if we get comfortable with the idea of self-isolation and give up on others, we can end up not only lonely, but bitter too. So, finding a balance is vital and it means we have not only need to look out for others, but maybe we also have to look into the hidden depths of ourselves.

Prayer

God of Grace, you call us to be different from the world, but the world is seductive, God of Vision, you hold before us an alternate way of life, but the world is powerful. Hence, we are drawn in to follow its priorities and accept its values.

God who blesses the meek, the peacemakers, the merciful, forgive us when we lose sight of these qualities and misunderstand their role in the world.
